The recent events in Paris have horrified the world and brought us all closer together, showning us that humanity, compassion, and love can still thrive in the most violent, inhumane situations. As we in the United States come together with our families over the holiday season, it gives us a chance for deeper reflection on those events.

As musicians, we express our emotions through our music. As Leonard Bernstein said, "This will be our reply to violence: to make music more instensely, more beautifully, more devotedly than ever before." This is a lesson we can share with our students.

We all feel close to the citizens of Paris. This could have happened anywhere. I thought it would be fitting to share some of their music with our students. Like the other arrangements, this arrangement has been designed to allow students of all levels to play together. The twinkle parts consist of open strings and are designed to be taught by rote. The Violin Book I part is for students working in Suzuki Violin School, Book 1 and is also designed to be taught by rote. The other string parts require basic note reading skills and are on the level of Books 2 and 3. An optional Advanced Violin part is included, requiring knowledge of third position. There is also a piano part for rehearsal purposes which may be used in performance if needed. This arrangement is ideal for both mixed-level Suzuki Group Classes and school string programs.

The arrangement includes six selections: Bizet's L'Arésienne, Alouette, Frère Jacques, Offenbach's Can-Can, Debussy's Clair de Lune and La Marseillaise (French National Anthem.) There are also brief quotes from Gershwin's, An American in Paris, Mahler's Symphony No. 1 and Schumann's Two Grenadiers. As a suite, the work is approximately eight minutes in length. Each individual piece may also be performed separately. These are marked in the score by brackets ([]).

I hope you and your students will enjoy this arrangement and take this opportunity to learn more about French music and at the same time feel a solidarity with the French people.
